

#### RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board approve Resolution 7266 authorizing the submittal of an application to the Bay Area Air Quality Management District (BAAQMD) for school bus replacement funds.

#### **DISCUSSION**

The BAAQMD is making funding available to public school districts under the California Air Resources Board's Lower-Emission School Bus Program. This program provides funding to replace or retrofit older school buses to reduce harmful emissions of diesel particulate matter and oxides of nitrogen. BUSD has been very successful over the last 10 years in utilizing available resources and grant programs to replace an aging diesel fleet with clean and alternative fuel school buses. Transportation has three remaining pre-1977 Type I school buses in its fleet. In the past few years the grant programs have moved away from funding the total cost of buses and infrastructure to funding formulas that include matching funds.

#### FINANCIAL IMPLICATION

We will request 2-3 replacement buses. We will include specification options that conform to current fleet standards. The BAAQMD expects matching funds from the District at a cap of \$25,000 per bus. Total price quoted per bus, including specifications to meet fleet standards, is \$142,464.96. Pending successful application for funds from BAAQMD, total cost to district per bus would be \$35,320.32 (including increased specifications to meet fleet standards). This amount can be financed over 5 year or 7 year period.

WHEREAS, the Berkeley Unified School District provides bus transportation to students as part of the regular business operations; and

WHEREAS, the Berkeley Unified School District recognizes that air quality has an impact on the health and welfare of the people in the Bay Area, Alameda County and the City of Berkeley, and especially on children; and

WHEREAS, federal health based ground level ozone standards must be met in 2005; and

WHEREAS, ground level ozone standards are exceeded due primarily to oxides of nitrogen emissions from heavy duty vehicles; and

WHEREAS, the California Air Resources Board and Bay Area Air Quality Management District have determined that particulate matter in diesel exhaust is a toxic air contaminate; and

WHEREAS, the Berkeley Unified School District is concerned about student exposure to ground level ozone and toxic air contaminants; and

WHEREAS, the Berkeley Unified School District has demonstrated a long-term commitment to alternatively fueled vehicles; and

WHEREAS, the Berkeley Unified School District currently operates seven low emission, compressed natural gas school buses; and

WHEREAS, the Bay Area Air Quality Management District has requested applications for funds for school bus replacement, with a requirement of a school district match of a maximum of \$25,000 per bus in return; and

WHEREAS, the Berkeley Unified School District would be eligible to receive a portion of funds awarded to the Bay Area Air Quality Management District

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Berkeley Unified School District hereby resolves to support the Bay Area Air Quality District's application to provide cost-share for the purchase of compressed natural gas school buses.

After School Learning Program Fee Schedule for 2001-2002

**RECOMMENDATION:** It is recommended that the Board of Education approve the proposed sliding scale fee increase for the elementary school After School Learning Programs (Rosa Parks, Thousand Oaks, City of Franklin, Cragmont, John Muir, Emerson, and Malcolm X).

#### **DISCUSSION:**

The After School Learning and Safe Neighborhood Partnership Program (ASLSNPP) require a 50% match for the funding. Since the beginning of the programs we have depended on parent fees to support our share of the match and to support a quality and enriching program. Our 21<sup>st</sup> Century Learning grants are not renewable and require a sustainability plan that encourages a sliding scale fee based program, where appropriate.

BUSD offers 5 day a week, up to 4-5 hours a day after school programming that includes academics, recreation and enrichment, including full programming on early release Wednesdays. We receive only \$5.00 per day per student for the ASLSNPP program. We are requesting a minimal fee increase for the next school year so that we can offer a broad array of programming for our students and provide adequate staff /student ratios. The highest proposed fee is still below the market rate for after school programming in Berkeley. The current market rate for Alameda County for afterschool childcare is \$393.84 according to the California Childcare Resource and Referral Market Rate Survey.

The fee is not used as a factor to reject students who are in need of the services. Any family has the opportunity to meet with the site coordinator to make other arrangements if necessary.
